

DANGAR ISLAND LEAGUE INC PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to Spring !

We've all made it through another beautiful winter, with the requisite amount of spectacular bio-luminescence in the river – one of the many joys of living here.

The League has been active on a number of issues. These include placement of some benches around the island, the closing of the Police Station in Brooklyn, use of the water tank on the top of the island, the proposed pathway from Kangaroo Point to Parsley Bay, as well as supporting others in their endeavours (the Hall Committee in its stand with the Council, etc). Come to the AGM to hear details!

The primary issue taking much of our effort is still that of water access. As you know, we established a group to look into the 3 main areas of water access, and how we could resolve them with a single solution. These are the need for a handicap accessible wharf on the island, some public wharf space for the boating public to allow them to visit the island for short periods, and a mechanism to provide a wharf based mooring structure for residents of the island to park their tinnies.

In February we polled the island residents and found strong interest and support from residents on this topic. Since then we have pursued the development of a design acceptable to the residents and relevant agencies. These agencies include Hornsby Shire Council, Maritime and the Department of Lands – the number of Government groups involved makes this a challenge. In addition, we have initiated some discussion on what sort of structure is appropriate for us to “manage” the residents’ parking spots. I’ll use the term ‘co-op’ in general for this and we are currently looking at a modified version of the model used for Brooklyn, but with substantial changes to match our obviously different requirements.

We are still in discussion with these groups but we ARE making progress. At October’s AGM we will present the current status of the discussions as well as seek further input from residents and owners.

As we move towards establishing the structure to manage the residents’ tinny parking spots, it is VERY important for all interested owners and residents to be involved, express their views and know the options and impacts. Please try to attend the October AGM of the League, or submit your comments to me in advance at president@dangarislandleague.net.

In addition, we are keen to make sure we can contact all house owners during the establishment of this organization – there are a number we can’t easily contact. If you are one (or you know the owner of the house you rent or know of a neighbour whose mailing address we may not have) it would be great if you could let us know how to make contact.

HALL COMMITTEE REPORT

As many of you are aware, Hornsby Shire Council have been considering the centralisation of the management of all community halls and centres in the shire. The members of the Dangar Island Hall management committee (the committee) and many other members of the Dangar Island community disagree with this proposal as it would remove management responsibilities from the community and with it the flexibility and spontaneity of hall use that are so characteristic of our community.

In addition to expressing our views about the management of the hall at the various meetings to which committees were invited, we commissioned the preparation of a proposal for the management of our hall and collected signatures in support of this proposal.

Thank you to the 160+ members of the community and 30 visitors to the island who signed this petition. The signatures added weight to the proposal, which was very well received by councillors and council staff. If you would like to make a contribution towards the payment of the proposal (that we had prepared and submitted to council), please leave this in an envelope in the hall’s box at

While the final decision about how all halls and centres will be managed is still pending, we anticipate that the outcome for our hall will be the one we have been arguing for as it is the best model for our community, ie the Dangar Island Hall will continue to be managed by a committee formed by members of the community.



We're negotiating a Brooklyn event to round off the year - Ron Fricke's *Baraka* with a live soundtrack at The Edge.


