On behalf of everyone present, I would like to thank the previous members of the committee for their efforts. In particular, I would like to acknowledge the dedication of Peter Short. Peter is well known to all as a tireless worker in our community, who has served as League president and fire brigade captain. Peter was seriously injured the night before the League meeting, and we wish him well for a speedy recovery.

The AGM was followed by a General meeting which included discussion on a number of points that are of interest or concern to the community.

The issues discussed include the following:

- status of the sewer connection for the Community Centre and Bowling Club;
- restoration of the roads and paths after the completion of the sewer connection project;
- issues about using houses on the island for holiday rentals and the "river settlements review";
- questions about cats and dogs on the island, particularly with reference to dogs running free and lack of cleanup of faeces by both some locals and visitors;
- $\,$ questions about possible upgrades to the playground;
- maintenance of common areas on the island, such as the grass verges, playground area, etc;
- the future of the shop.

Extensive discussions on all these issues demonstrated the strength of community feeling and involvement in Island activities. The large turnout was very good to see!

I would like to add that I see the League as representing the community of the island – YOU. (Hmmm, this is starting to sound suspiciously like a political speech. Couldn't be further from the truth!).

I have opinions and views but I am also very aware of my status as a newcomer on the island and I am keen to see everyone get involved (or at least express their opinions). I do firmly believe that a small community like Dangar will be more successful in pursuit of our goals if we use a consensus approach – that is, if we present a unified front in our dealings with outside bodies such as Council, Sydney Water, etc.

I would like to ask anyone with views about island community matters to express them – either by writing to me as Dangar Island League President (drop it in the mailbox 141R) or by asking a committee member to bring up a topic at an executive meeting. We will hold periodic meetings to seek input from the community on issues that affect us. (The next executive meeting is Tuesday 28 October).

I look forward to meeting and working with everyone in looking after Dangar Island.

Why do I/we feel at home on islands and hill towns? Perhaps it's the sense of being in a village with shared values and lifestyle or the sense of protection afforded by a wall or shoreline, or the sense that the rest of the world is a long way away. After a week walking in the scrubby plateau above the Dordogne River, staying in fortified hill towns or 'bastides' and visting the Greek islands, I have a theory: Dangar Island is in fact a Greek island that sailed off on its own odyssey and, after many adventures ended up in the great south land. Dangaros (Δανγαροσ) perhaps Mulletarini (Μυλλεταρινι)?

Hydra, Poros and Aegina are close to Athens, each with a small village or two, and have much in common with our little bit of nirvana. The terrain is gentle, the contours slide into the sea, the sun always shines, the breeze always blows, the olivegreen vegetation kisses the water and nobody cares about the big city nearby. There is a creaky ferry every so often and timetables haven't been invented yet. Under grape trellises on the edge of tiny harbours time stands still with beer, wine, olives and thick coffee. The people are polite, do as little work as possible, muck about in boats and barbeque their catch. Donkeys do the heavy lifting and stray dogs sleep all day. Planning is random, architecture is simple and the buildings might get finished someday. Visitors are like flies: annoying but gone by sunset.

Sound familiar? Definitely worth a visit. My next postcard will be from Santorini, the cuckoo of the Aegean, a brooding hump of volcanic lava with white, organic villages clinging on by their fingernails. Miss October Gompholobium latifolium

Golden Glory Pea

A 1-2m high bush, growing in dappled shade in forests on sandstone.

The leaves consist of 3 leaflets, 3-5cm long and 3-5mm wide, flat or with margins slightly curved under.

Large single bright yellow flowers 3 cm wide, on short stalks usually on the upper branches. The keel of the flower is fringed by tiny white hairs.
